

# Seven Hills Looks Ahead

As we enter the month of March one can't help but reflect on the last 12 months. March 2020 was the time COVID became front and center of our daily lives and the beginning of a long chain events that have been very trying on all of us. Heading into spring I hope the healing process soon begins on all fronts. After witnessing our community come together so many times, in spite of so many challenges, I have no doubt this will once again be the case.

To start 2020 we experienced a 100-year rainfall. This past summer, a very rare microburst hit the center of the Seven Hills. To wrap up 2020 we were hit with the largest 24-hour snowfall in over 50 years. Seven Hills, so far, has weathered the COVID storm as well. We have managed to keep all essential City services operating safely throughout the year. Further, we have been able to completely offset the financial hardships that were brought upon us from the pandemic. We finished the year with over \$1.4 million in surplus general fund revenue and cash reserves over \$7 million!

Looking ahead to Spring/ Summer 2021, you will see robust infrastructure activity, economic development and not only the return, but also the addition of, new community events (as soon as it safe to do so).

more homes to be cleared this spring as part of this project.

In addition, we won the competitive county supplement grant for a gazebo to be built on Hillside and Broadview. We expect the new gazebo to be ready to serve the community this coming Memorial Weekend.

Further we have applied for two more county grants. The first is a block grant for \$150,000 towards new bathrooms, concessions and storage at Calvin park (by the ball fields). The other is a supplemental grant for \$50,000 towards a new community bus (The current bus is 19 years old, in poor shape and is not handicapped accessible).

For 2021, we have expanded our partnership with Cuyahoga County Public Works for additional sewer maintenance, cleaning and repairs.This partnership has enabled the City to perform significantly more sewer clean-

# "We Witnessed A Miracle": COVID-19 Survivor Goes Home After 76 Days

Carl Milano felt like a groom on the evening of his wedding day, anticipating the homecoming of his bride of 46 years. The Mayfield Village couple had survived COVID-19: he during a three-week bout at home, and Beverly during a marathon 76 days in two hospitals, including more than three weeks on a ventilator. They had missed Christmas and New Year's together, and on a snowy February afternoon just after Valentine's Day, he was taking his beloved home again. "We witnessed a miracle, and you all were a part of it," said a tearful Carl, bowing in thanks to all the

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The 2020 challenges did not slow our Partnerships and Progress goals down, in fact the uncertain economic environment has made the partnerships even more important. Below are just a few examples of what to expect:

Resurfacing of Chestnut Road is partly due to us being approved for funds through the County 50/50 program. The City will get the maximum \$250,000 allowed under the program towards this project.

We continue to work with the NEORSD to restore the natural floodplain in the Donna Rae / Forest Overlook area. You can expect a few ing that we have ever in past as we have the ability to utilize the County's Sewer Trucks (you may have noticed them working 2nd shift in your neighborhood) and our own in-house sewer team.

We will be receiving \$75,000 from the State Capital Budget towards new ADA compliant restrooms and a concession stand for Calvin Park.

Lastly, we utilized approximately \$92,000 of a NOPEC energy grant towards replace the old ballfield lights at Valleywood Park. The new LED lighting will create a safer playing field with significant

### Wedded To Success: Bride Loses More Than 140 Pounds With Bariatric Surgery

Ailene Zaebst walked down the aisle at her wedding more than 140 pounds lighter from bariatric surgery, completing a weight-loss journey that began 18 months earlier at University Hospitals Parma Medical Center. Her beloved, Adam, waited for her at the altar. But her unseen partners in this journey were an entire team of specialists at UH Parma, supporting her in positive changes to last a lifetime. Initially, Ailene was inspired by her Aunt Patty, who had pledged to lose 50 pounds before her 50th birthday and ultimately dropped more than 150 pounds. Losing 30 pounds before her 30th birthday should be quite achievable, she figured. Ailene met with Dietitian Dina Corrao, who put her on a 1,500 calorie per day diet and urged her to ramp up her exercise. She lost 40 pounds before she underwent surgery in September 2019 - and she's lost 100 pounds more since. The pre-surgery routines have been critical in ensuring long-term life changes. "Ailene has been a true example of success," says Anna Hazinakis, BS, RN, CBN, the clinical coordinator and assistant nurse manager of the Nutritional Health & Bariatric Surgery Center at UH Parma, who has been recognized as a Distinguished Bariatric Nurse by the American Society for Bariatric and Metabolic Surgery, which accredits the

program. "Ailene committed from day one to this journey and has been an inspiration to many around her."

This clinical nurse partner in a physician practice spends her days caring for the needs of patients. After suffering the loss of her baby niece who was born with a genetic disease, Ailene was depressed and turned to comfort food and a full work schedule for solace. She gained 50 pounds in six months and realized her weight was getting out of control. She weighed 360 pounds when she came to her first appointment at the Bariatric Center. "I needed permanent tools that would hold me accountable," said Ailene, whose previous weight loss efforts had failed. "I want to live a really, really long life, and enjoy my life. I knew something had to give."

Mujjahid Abbas, MD, a surgeon at UH Parma who specializes in bariatric surgery, told Ailene for all the energy and time she gives to her patients and loved ones, she needed to finally take care of herself. Through careful consultation with the team, Ailene chose a sleeve gastrectomy, in which two-thirds of the stomach is removed laparoscopi-

cally or robotically, leaving a stomach the size of banana. This surgery is less complex than gastric bypass, in which the intestines are rerouted. Six months later, a few months before that milestone birthday, Ailene checked in to UH Parma for the minimally invasive procedure. She spent one night in the hospital and then a few weeks recovering at home. She had the steady support of a large family, longtime friends and her UH Parma team. Three months after recovering from surgery, Ailene was engaged to her boyfriend of three years. Shopping for her wedding dress, after slimming down from a size 26 to a 16, was fun. Going out to dinner was more enjoyable when she didn't have to worry about squeezing into a cozy booth. "Those little things have been huge," she says.

The couple were married in the autumn in an intimate outdoor ceremony in Medina's public square. A few of her childhood friends, who have stood by her since her first struggles with weight in adolescence, flanked her in the small wedding party, celebrating her truly new life. Inspired by her father, a runner for the past three decades, Ailene started running in the past year and met her goal of finishing a 5k in under 30 minutes. ### PCSD Bond Issue Fast Facts: May 2021

• New construction bond issue for the Parma City School District will be on the ballot May 4, 2021.

• If passed, PCSD will cut the number of high school and middle school buildings from six to two.

• The two new school buildings will each house Grades 6-12 with a middle and high school sharing one roof but featuring their own entrances, administration and class-room spaces.

• The new buildings will be built on the current sites of Normandy and Valley Forge High Schools.

• The 6.3-mill bond issue will cost taxpayers \$18.38 per month per \$100,000 of their home value. The term of the bond issue is 37 years.

Bond issue can only be used for construction of buildings, not operating expenses.The state will pay \$69 million of the cost of new construction. The state will not

provide any funding to renovate.

### Make Your Spring Garden **Better & Deer Resistant!**

We're all looking to a warm and sunny Spring. Those first warm breezes refresh both the gardener and the garden, but many of us have a love-hate relationship with deer. No plant is impervious to deer browsing but the least damaged by deer have one or more traits that deer dislike. In general, ornamental grasses make a great deer resistant plant, because of their thin tough, sharp edged foliage. Pastel colors, such as pink, lavender and white create a classic Spring look. These soft colors are easy to mix and match, but swap out the tulips (deer love the petals) for daffodils and irises which deer shy away from. Hyacinths are one of the very few bulbs that can legitimately be called deer proof. The bulbs are poisonous to deer and squirrels. Typically, deer tend to stay away from eating peonies due to the strong flavor. Other plants deer tend to avoid include crocus, Glory-of-the-snow, Snowdrops, and Grape Hyacinths.

Spring blooming plants come in all shapes and sizes, from large flowering shrubs to tiny bulbs. So as one can see, one can have a great Spring garden and

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but her other children – two of whom work at UH - stayed away to avoid gatherings. She was upset initially, but she barely remembers that. When her daughter-in-law checked on her the following week, she was clearly ill and they called 9-1-1. Medics found her oxygen saturation was only 59 percent, when it should be 95 to 100 percent. Yet she was sitting up and talking, unaware. Beverly was taken to another Cleveland-area hospital, where she spent more than three weeks in the ICU. Once she was out of the ICU, she experienced some other health complications related to her kidneys and liver. When she was strong enough to leave the hospital, her family secured a spot at UH Parma's Acute Rehabilitation Center for intensive physical and occupational therapy.

While it was on the opposite side of town from their homes, it was worth the drive, says daughter- in-law Maria Milano, a UH research nurse focusing on leukemia and lymphoma. During nearly a month of therapy, Beverly advanced from needing two to three people assisting her to stand and ambulate to getting out of bed on her final day all by herself, says Bernice Eldridge, occupational therapist. "This rehab facility is a hidden gem, I would highly recommend it," says Maria. "Everyone was so nice. And being able to have a visitor was a deciding factor for us." Added Beverly, who missed the holidays with her family while isolated in the ICU: "I don't think I would have done as good if I didn't have any visitors. This is a wonderful place."

UH ensured that Beverly would go home to enjoy more holidays with her family, including daughter Michelle Piper, Executive Assistant to West Market Chief Operating Officer Brian Monter, based at UH Parma. While Beverly doesn't remember last Christmas or New Year's Day, she's not about to forget the past month at UH Parma. And she's happy to be home with her husband of 46 years. "She knocked on heaven's door twice," Michelle says of her mother's 76-day ordeal. "We got her back. I'm very proud to call this woman my mother, and I'm incredibly proud that our UH caregivers brought her back to health. We have so many reasons to celebrate."



Totaling nearly \$70 billion, the state budget makes two-year appropriations for healthcare, early child through higher education, workforce development, local government, and more. While many Democratic legislators have been working to correct the inequalities in our education system, Covid-19's virtual schooling has further highlighted these inequities. Throughout the pandemic, students with poor internet access struggled, and so increasing broadband support across the state is a budget priority this year. We must also establish a fair funding formula to better support our public education. And finally, teachers are the backbone of our education system, so we must guarantee a livable wage for all, including early childhood educators.

Over the past year, my office has connected dozens of constituents to unemployment benefits assistance as the pandemic continues to affect Ohioans economically as well. Commitment to the economic success of Ohio's workers will continue to be a priority for me. This includes increased funding resources for our small businesses and women-owned businesses in the state's budget.

As we begin working on the state budget, I will be meeting with mayors, city council members, constituents, and stakeholders in the following weeks to work on these budget priorities.
