ings, hearings, and calls, I keep these needs in mind, advocating for the responsible use of our tax dollars.

I am advocating for over \$45 million in funding for 15 critical projects across Ohio's seventh district through the Community Funding Project (CPF) appropriations process.

The CPF process allows members of Congress, rather than bureaucrats in the executive branch, to direct tax dollars to projects important to local communities. Community projects come from existing funding streams and do not increase federal spending.

My office received over 60 project funding requests; however, I am only able to submit 15 to the Appropriations Committee. During the application and selection process, my team and I communicated with mayors, council members, county officials, and others to determine which projects would best meet the needs of our community and have the largest impact. Two of the 15 projects that were chosen would impact the Parma area directly.

One project is the Manorford Drive Reconstruction Project in Parma Heights, for which I requested \$3,433,285. If funded, this project will provide a full-depth concrete

Message From Parma Law Director Scott M. Tuma

In Parma Municipal Court, 3 men admitted to their roles in criminal acts relating to both the attempted vandalism of the 7-foot flamingo statue located at Zielinski Park and a theft of alcohol involving Sheetz Convenience Store located at 6767 Ridge Road.

I and my staff reviewed the evidence from the alleged offenses, met with lawyers for each defendant, and negotiated resolutions of all pending cases against Taylor Paul Pupkiewicz, 25, Marcus Anthony Balue, 25 and David Ross Burak, 24. While the damage to Parma's flamingo has gathered much media attention, it is important to note that not only is this a symbol of civic pride for the City of Parma, but also city property. As the Chief Prosecutor for this community, it is my duty to balance the need for accountability and restitution towards the wrongdoers, with the need for deterrence and healing towards our community. I believe the resolution of this case reflects that balance.

Pupkiewicz, Balue, and Burak stood before Judge Deanna O'Donnell and accepted the sentence handed down. Each defendant received a ten-day jail sentence, full restitution to the City of Parma for the damage inflicted, 3



years of probation, and 500 hours of community service. In addition, Judge O'Donnell mandated that each defendant provide a written apology to both the City of Parma and Robert Funk, who provided the funds for the construction of the flamingo statue. I commended Judge O'Donnell for her innovative sentencing in the case.

The pink flamingo serves as Parma's unofficial mascot. Some love it, some might not.

But regardless of where you stand on the flamingo's role in Parma, we can all agree that damaging public property is unacceptable and those who inflict such damage should and will continue to endure the consequences of their criminality. Now we can all move on to other matters.

The Representative's Corner

I am very excited to announce that since last month's column, Governor Michael DeWine signed my first bill into law. For those of you who read my monthly column, you will recall that last May my fellow freshman Rep. Steve Demetriou (R - Bainbridge Township) and I introduced House Bill (H.B.) 195. This bipartisan bill will create an adaptive mobility car dealer license in Ohio.

Currently, car dealers who retrofit vehicles for the disabled community are operating in a gray area under Ohio law. H.B. 195 will clear up this area of the law to the benefit of legitimate car dealers and those they serve. Our bill will lead to more adaptive dealers entering the market and result in better quality, lower prices, more choices, and further innovations in the adaptive automobile space. In fact, our bill will benefit disabled and senior Ohioans in many ways, including giving them peace of mind that the vehicles they purchase are safe and reliable and that the vehicle warranties will be honored.

Governor DeWine was gracious enough to grant us a signing ceremony in his historic Statehouse office. Sur-



rounded by my wife, children, friends, and those who assisted with the bill, the Governor signed the bill and gifted me the pen he used to do so. With a tear in my eye, I told him what an honor it was for this thirty-year government teacher, who taught how a bill becomes to law to thousands of students, to be living my life's work.

I went to Columbus to get things done for Ohio – to get things done for you. As of this writing, less than thirty bills have been passed the Ohio General Assembly since you sent me there in January, 2023. As a new member, I am very proud to say that one of those few bills is mine – and there are more getting very

close. Further, I have sponsored more bills than any of the 132 members of the Ohio General Assembly at 261. The next highest is 212. I will join any of my colleagues on a bill, regardless of party, if I feel it is good for Ohioans.

It continues to be a high honor to constantly work very hard for you and to serve as your state representative. I pray how much I care about you and our state comes through. Five-Star Child Care Center At UH Parma Honors Graduates

The 31 children who proudly marched up the red carpet and onto the stage at Pre-Kindergarten graduation weren't the only stars shining recently at UH Parma's Child Care Center. One by one, these beaming 5-year-olds shook hands with their teachers and received their diplomas as "Pomp and Circumstance" played.

These teachers and their charges are part of a four-decade legacy of excellence, reinforced once again with another Five-Star rating in the State of Ohio's Step Up to Quality program. With approximately 150 students enrolled and 100 children there on any given day, the children are taught in classrooms arranged by age, from younger and older infants, toddlers, preschoolers and pre-Kindergarten. They learn from certified teachers, receive hot lunches and structured days with detailed reports daily for each child. They play outside, take first steps and form their first friendships.

For more than 41 years, UH Parma's Child Care Center has been the first school for thousands of children and grandchildren of hospital caregivers. And this Center, which received a pandemic exemption from the State of Ohio to remain open for the children of essential workers when many of these graduates were infants, has taught them resilience and adaptability

in an ever-changing world.

"I remember many of these graduates when they were in the infant room just learning to walk," said Manager Leah Anastasakis, M.Ed., addressing the families at commencement. "The teachers have worked tirelessly to maintain stable and nurturing classrooms so that their students could thrive despite experiencing very scary world events. The teachers have helped to develop a love of learning and encouraged students to practice being a good friend.

"We are forever grateful you allowed us to be part of your journey."

The longevity of its staff is a testament to the quality of the program. Three teachers - Jennifer Garczynski, Infant Lead Teacher; Debbie O'Connell, Infant Teacher's Assistant; and Maria Armeni, Preschool Lead Teacher - have more than 30 years of experience, caring for countless siblings and even generations of families. Pre-K Lead Teacher Maria Karlak has more than 20 years. Degreed teachers and detailed lesson plans are among the reasons the Child Care Center earns the top rating in Step Up to Quality, a quality program established by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services and the Ohio Department of Education.

"At UH Parma Medical Center, quality care by compassionate caregivers who

embrace our community calling is our hallmark," said Chief Operating Officer James Hill, MD, MBA. "So it should come as no surprise that this approach extends to the precious children and grandchildren of our caregivers."

The Child Care Center is also in the final stages of a renovation – funded by \$250,000 from the Parma Hospital Health Care Foundation – to consolidate Child Care classrooms on the north end of the UH Parma Health Education Center. Infants and Toddlers will be in the same hallway, with new Infant rooms in the former Home Health Care area and new Preschool rooms in the area once occupied by ElderCenter. Toddlers will move

into the former Preschool rooms. This restructuring also allows the Center to enhance security with one point of entry for parents dropping off and picking up children.

"The Foundation has been so wonderful in helping us to accomplish our goals," said Leah. "Their contribution means the world to us. Our employees and families are looking forward to the updated spaces with increased safety and security. Moving the infant and toddlers to the hallway with the older children will make oversight easier as well. We are very thankful to the Foundation for all their support!"

Preserving The Richness Of Parma Heights' Architectural Legacy

In the May issue of the Parma Observer, Emory Pinter's piece on National Preservation Month in architecture shone a spotlight on the status of the current Parma Heights library branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library, with a call for preserving and re-purposing the 60-plus year-old building on Pearl Road.

=The library's architect, John F. Lipaj, was active in the greater Cleveland area in the last part of the 20th century. Other buildings he designed that people would instantly recognize include Normandy High School, St. John the Baptist Byzantine Church on Snow Road, and St. Columbkille school, all in Parma.

The city of Parma Heights, particularly along the main commercial strip along Pearl Road, is a treasure trove of mid 20th century modernist architectural buildings, and the Parma



Heights library is a good example of the so-called "googie" style.

The mid-century modern style known as "googie" is known for the its use of circles and circular and rounded design elements and oddshaped buildings with corresponding flourishes and details. The designs

associated with the style are representative of the space age, flying saucer shapes, zig-zagging roof lines, and star-burst design details (think of the classic "Welcome to Las Vegas" sign, for example.) It was a visual representation of the country's fascination with the new space age and post-war population boom, and the building boom that followed.

With a new library building in the works, the fate of the 60-plus yearold building looks uncertain at this point. Which is why it's important to raise awareness of the building and its history and its place within both the history of the city of Parma Heights but also within larger cultural and national architectural currents may help to preserve it and maybe even put it on the

course for some creative reuse.

The practical problem to work out is how to reuse the old library building, to keep its unique look and feel and place in the community, but in a second life and for many generations to come.

The city has an opportunity to honor its past by preserving and repurposing a building with significant cultural and aesthetic significance.

The stretch of Pearl Road from York/Stumph Road north has many fine examples of modernist buildings, including the beloved East Coast Custard (a re-purposed Arby's building), the Ohio Savings Building designed by architect Don Hisaka (recently renamed the Flagstar Bank), the distinctive, circular Flyers bar building, and the Yorktown Lanes flying-V sign.

So much rich, historical architecture on that stretch of Pearl Road in Parma Heights is an incredible asset to the community and can be a draw for fans of architecture, even a destination point. It would be a great shame if the city and community didn't take advantage of this opportunity to plan for preserving this rich legacy and make Parma Heights a destination for architecture and history buffs alike.

When The Nation Watched And A Demagogue Went Down

This spring saw another key anniversary from 1954, seventy years ago that could have some ramifications for the present time. Wisconsin's Republican Senator Joseph McCarthy was perhaps the most powerful man in Washington DC and at one time had a veto power over presidential appointments. But in a Senate hearing in June 1954, he was brought down by an old lawyer from Boston.

Joseph McCarthy was a little known first term Senator from Wisconsin when in February 1950 at a gathering in West Virginia where he was invited to speak, he revealed that he had a list of communists who were actively working in the government including the State Department. The numbers of alleged communists varied from thirty to over 200 communists. The media jumped on this, and this became a national sensation.

At that time, people in the United States were uneasy. In 1949, the Chinese communists under the leadership of Mao Zedong had taken over mainland China and forced the Chinese Nationalist government under leader Chaing Kai Shek fled to the island of Taiwan. China had been a key ally of the United States in the Pacific during the Second World War. This communist takeover of China came on the heels of the Soviet Union taking over the governments of eastern Europe and establishing "puppet governments" loyal to Mos-

cow. Also, in September 1949, the nation learned that the Soviet Union had successfully detonated an atomic bomb.

Now Senator McCarthy gave the American people something to blame, and the witch hunt was on for communists in the government. Even the election of Republican Dwight Eisenhower as President wasn't enough to quell this suspicion of communist infiltration in our government. A few actual communists were discovered and prosecuted, and this fed the suspicion that there were more undermining the country.

This all came to a head in the Army - McCarthy hearings in the spring of 1954 when Senator McCarthy was probing communist infiltration in the army. When asked to produce actual names of people to match the number of communists that he had McCarthy only went on the attack. McCarthy went on the attack on a young associate of the law firm of the Senate's chief attorney but he was not involved in these hearings because of his membership in an organization when he was in college that may have had communist leanings.

In a climactic moment the Senate's chief attorney asked Senator Joseph McCarthy, "have you no sense of decency? You are attacking a young man who has a bright future with our firm, and until this moment, Senator, I think that I never really gauged your

cruelty or recklessness." It was at that moment that the public saw Joseph McCarthy as the uncouth bully that he had been all along.

The conclusion of those hearings found that Senator McCarthy had found nothing about communist infiltration in the Army and the public was repulsed with Joseph McCarthy's tactics. On December 2, 1954, the Senate censured Joseph McCarthy by a vote of 67 to 22. Senator Joseph McCarthy had been discredited. He became a pariah in the Senate as few listened to his harangues about communists. He died from the effects of alcoholism in May 1957 at the age of 48.

One of the key members of Senator Joseph McCarthy's team during those Army – McCarthy hearings in 1954 was a young 27-year-old attorney named Roy Cohn. He was McCarthy's lead henchman who emulated McCarthy's aggressive method of attacking opponents. After the fall of Joseph McCarthy, Roy Cohn went to New York city where he engaged in the practice of law. He gained a reputation as a "fixer" and his clients included mob figures like John Gotti and a retired Harvard law school professor, Alan Dershowitz.


He also worked on Nixon's 1972 campaign and was instrumental in leaking the medical records of McGovern's Vice-Presidential candidate Senator Thomas Eagleton to the press. Those confidential records

revealed that Senator Eagleton had been treated for depression. The furor resulted in McGovern dropping Eagleton from the ticket and replacing him with Kennedy-in-law Sargent Shriver.

Two other clients of Roy Cohn were Rupert Murdoch, who later would start Fox News and a young Donald Trump. Roy Cohn's style as an attorney was modeled after Senator Joseph McCarthy's method of attacking and never backing down or admitting a mistake. Roy Cohn was involved in the construction of Trump Tower in Manhattan. In 1984, Roy Cohn, who was gay, was diagnosed with AIDS. In 1986, a fivejudge panel of the New York Supreme Court disbarred Roy Cohn for unethical and unprofessional conduct that included misappropriation of client funds. Roy Cohn died from the effects of AIDS on August 2, 1986, at the age of 59.

This comes as no surprise to me that there is a direct line from Senator Joseph McCarthy and his tactics as well as lack of any real proof of communist infiltration in government and Roy Cohn's dishonest style as an attorney to Donald Trump and how he has operated for most of his life. Apparently, Donald Trump had a good mentor and teacher. But like Senator Joseph McCarthy and Roy Cohn; Donald Trump will eventually be brought down by his own faults and failings.

Stearns House Replica On Display




