# Foster Closer Collaboration Between Schools And Families For Children's Success

# Times That Kept A-Changin

After WWII, the economy roared back to life and young Americans shared in the wealth. By 1956 the average American teenager had \$10.55 a week to spend. That was about the same amount an entire American family had to spend after bills were paid at the end of the Great Depression. And spend it they did on Music, clothes, movies, and cars. Whole industries sprang up to relieve teens of their spending money. In 1959 teenagers bought ten million record players and countless transistor radios, machines that gave them the freedom to listen to their own music. Most of it was rock 'n' roll, a new music that often separated them from their parents. Not everyone was invited to party. Many young blacks were still



stuck in poverty, and in the South they were still humiliated by segregation laws. But their times were changing too. In 1951, a Farmville, Virginia High School junior named Barbara Johns led her classmates out of their school to protest their overcrowded building,

broken down desks, and inferior supplies. The students stayed out for two weeks, and strike developed into a lawsuit against the town. Such behavior was shocking, but it was only the beginning. In the years to follow, young people, white and black, powered the Civil Rights movement, sometimes sacrificing their lives to overthrow segregation laws. As Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., put it, "The blanket of fear was lifted by Negro youth." Their example inspired other young Americans to step forward in the following years.

They challenged America's involvement in the Vietnam War and fought to expand opportunities for women and girls Young environmentalists insisted on the importance of a safe and beautiful planet. In 1963, songwriter Bob Dylan wrote "THE TIMES THEY ARE A CHAHGIN". The song became an anthem of the day, and with good reason. Times changed like lightning in the second half of the twentieth century, and young people had never been more at the center of the action.

# Laurel Garden Club To Dissolve After 71 Years

After 71 years of service to the community, the Laurel Garden Club (LGC) has announced the difficult decision to dissolve the organization, effective at the end of 2024. This decision was made following thoughtful discussion at the club's anniversary dinner meeting, where members voted to formally conclude the club's operations.

Founded in 1953, the Laurel Garden Club has a long history of contributing to the local community through educational programs, horticultural projects, and environmental advocacy. Notably, the club was the first in Ohio to dedicate both a Blue Star Memorial Marker and a Gold Star By-Way Marker at the same time, a project that took over two years to complete and was installed in Veterans Memorial Park in 2017. This achievement stands as a testament to the club's commitment to honoring veterans and enhancing the community. However, as is the case with many long-standing organizations, the club has faced increasing challenges in attracting and retaining members and maintaining engagement in an evolving landscape of volunteerism.

In a statement, club officers noted, "The Laurel Garden Club has

been a vital part of the community for more than seven decades, and we are incredibly grateful for the passion and dedication shown by our members throughout the years. This decision, while difficult, reflects the changing dynamics of community involvement."

As part of the dissolution process, the club outlined plans for the distribution of its remaining funds to two organizations that share its commitment to community and environmental causes: Friends of the Brooklyn Branch Library and Gardenview Horticultural Park. Both organizations are 501(c) (3) non-profits, ensuring that the club's financial legacy will continue to support valuable educational and horticultural endeavors.

The LGC's recent partnership with the Friends of the Brooklyn Branch Library to co-sponsor a speaker series will be supported through a \$500 contribution toward future programs.

Gardenview Horticultural Park, a 16-acre botanical garden and arboretum in Strongsville, was named to receive the remaining funds. Gardenview's mission is to develop and maintain gardens of rare plants and flowers that provide enjoyment, education, and inspiration to the public.

The Brooklyn Historical Society will serve as the repository for the Lau-

rel Garden Club's historical archive, preserving its legacy for future generations.

In conclusion, the Laurel Garden Club's officers expressed gratitude for the members' years of service and encouraged the community to continue honoring the club's legacy. "It has been a privilege to serve alongside such dedicated individuals, and we are thankful for the connections made over the years."

About the Laurel Garden Club: The Laurel Garden Club was founded in 1953. It is a charter member of the Garden Club of Ohio, Inc. and a member of the National Garden Club, Inc. with the mission to promote gardening and horticultural education, contribute to the beautification of the local community, and foster a spirit of volunteerism and environmental stewardship. Throughout its 71 years, the club has made significant contributions to the community through gardening projects, educational programs, and partnerships with local organizations.

Garden clubs that are recognized by the National Garden Club, Inc. are the only non profit organizations to install Blue Star or Gold Star Memorial Markers in the United States. LGC chose this civic project for the Brooklyn community and worked on the Blue Star/Gold Star Memorial Marker project for over two years with installation in 2017. The Laurel Garden Club was the first garden club in Ohio to dedicate the Blue Star Memorial Marker and the Gold Star By-Way marker at the same time. The markers are located in Veterans Memorial Park.

# A Disgrace To The American Presidency

I have a DVD from PBS that is a brief biography of the men who served as President of the United States. The most recent President featured in this series is Barack Obama. The introduction to this series states "the office of the President of the United States was created by the constitution to allow the people to choose the person to be the Chief Executive and head of state for the nation." It goes on to say, "the Presidents of the United States have reflected the people's desires and wishes for the nation with the times.

So far there have been forty-five men (we have yet to elect a woman as President) who have occupied that office since George Washington became President in 1789. At that time, George Washington was the unanimous choice to lead the new nation. He fulfilled that office with dignity and in 1796, he decided to step down after serving two four-year terms as President. Since then, we have elected forty-four men to that office as the role of the President has changed considerably since the time of George Washington.

So, I ask; what does the election of Donald Trump mean for the nation and how does that election reflect the values and beliefs of the people of the United States? Donald Trump is only the second President elected to a second nonconsecutive term as President. The first was Grover Cleveland who became the 24th President after being elected to that second term in 1892. His second term was a disaster as the economy collapsed with the "Panic of 1893" that was the worst economic crisis since the "Panic of 1837 and the Great Depression of the 1930s.

His second term was marked by riots from workers and labor unions began to organize workers and there were strikes. He became very unpopular. His Democratic party lost control of congress in the 1894 mid-term elections, and he became a pariah in his own party.

One of the most comprehensive rankings of the Presidents is the quadrennial CSPAN ranking of the Presidents that was last done in 2021. The latest one should be released later this year and will include Joe Biden as well as Donald Trump. This presidential ranking uses several metrics such as foreign relations, managing the economy, public persuasion, relations with congress, moral authority, ensuring equal justice for all, crisis management, vision or setting an agenda and performance in the context of the times. This ranking is done by a panel of presidential historians, men and women who have dedicated years to the study of the American presidency.

Donald Trump was ranked at #41, or fourth from the bottom. He was just above Franklin Pierce, Andrew Johnson and James Buchanan at the bottom. James Buchanan served from 1857 until 1861 and when he left office, the nation was on the brink of a bloody four-year Civil War.

At the top of the rankings, there is no surprise. Ranked in the "top ten" are (in order) are Abraham Lincoln (who succeeded James Buchanan and was succeeded by Andrew Johnson), George Washington, Franklin D Roosevelt, Theodore Roosevelt, Dwight Eisenhower, Harry Truman, Thomas Jefferson, John F Kennedy, Ronald Reagan and Barack Obama.

A preview of the 2025 version shows Donald Trump solidly ranked as dead last as the worst President of all at #45. It shows Joe Biden raked at #14. In the 2025 ranking,

No doubt Donald Trump's ranking at the bottom in the preview of the



2025 survey has to do with his conviction in the New York trial. He is the only former President to be convicted of a felony after leaving office. In addition, he was facing criminal charges (since delayed) of inciting a riot by his supporters that stormed the Capitol on January 6, 2021, with the intention of preventing the constitutional certification of his electoral loss in the 2020

presidential election. It is my belief that those two actions, a felony conviction and his attempt to prevent the peaceful transfer of power following his electoral defeat should have permanently disqualified him from ever holding a public office, especially the Presidency.

The presidency should not be a "get out of jail free" Monopoly card. Any person who could not obtain or keep a license to sell insurance or securities or pass a background check to become an adult advisor to a youth group should not be allowed to become President of the United States. I am wondering just what those men who wrote the constitution, the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence might be thinking if they can look down on the nation that they founded right now.

Donald Trump is a disgrace to the office of the President of the United States. Does his election really reflect on the people of the nation? What does the election of Donald Trump say about what the American people think and believe?



# Parma Heights Library Is An Important Landmark On Route 42

The Parma Heights Library might be one of the most important historic buildings in Parma Heights. While Route 42 is more often thought of as a major thoroughfare connecting various smaller towns, these areas offer a variety of experiences that highlight the cultural, historical, and natural beauty of the regions it passes through. The old library would be the perfect place to host the Parma Heights Historical Society, and a teen/senior center. A museum can increase our sense of well-being, help us feel proud of where we have come from, can inspire, challenge and stimulate us, and become a destination spot for locals and visitors.

OK, is this idea too far-fetched? Could the considerable talents of both the historical society and Parma Heights residents be lashed together to finally bring this important project to reality? There are millions of dollars in grants available and community residents that want to donate.

U.S. Route 42 (US 42) is a significant east-west highway in the eastern United States, spanning approximately 350 miles. It begins in Louisville, Kentucky, and ends in Cleveland, Ohio. Unlike many U.S. highways, US 42 does not extend across the country and serves as a regional connector.. Entering Ohio, the highway moves through cities like Cincinnati, where you will encounter Fountain Square with historic fountains and a great spot to experience local events and food. U.S. Route 42 also passes though historic downtown Lebanon, a charming town with preserved 19th-century buildings and shops. Yellow Springs, a quirky town known for its artistic vibe, and ecoconscious community with the nearby Glen Helen Nature Preserve. Cedarville is a beautiful small town originally settled by Irish and Scottish immigrants in 1799, and is the home to Cedarville University, which has a nice campus and lake that are open to public visits. And one can't forget about Mansfiled, Ashland, and Medina. Then there is the Parma Heights Library on US 42 where Parma Heights was the first municipality in Ohio to pass a bond issue specifically for the construction of a library, and the library is the perfect example of the architectural style known as Googie (pronounced ghooghee, with two hard G's).

It might be a history that maybe is not as important as the bigger



histories that are taught, but nonetheless, it is important to many who live here. It's time for the city to conduct a full survey of its historic resources to understand where to dedicate resources and attention. To my knowl-

edge, it has never been done. Every city has a different attitude about saving historic structures. The community's interest is shown with 400 signatures to re-purpose the library. Among preservationists, some of whom use social

media to ping others there's much optimism. Parma Heights needs a city preservation plan. It would be a community endeavor to look at priorities in Parma Heights so that we're being very thoughtful and energetic about preservation, not just admiring old photos on Facebook. Politicians and the public have to make preservation a priority. Everyone should learn about how historic preservation ordinances should change. Developers could also learn more about the incentives that can make rehabbing historic buildings more attractive financially.

Buildings renewed and reused keep Parma Heights unique character alive! Preservation isn't always about grand landmarks. Many not-so-glamorous buildings have been saved around Cuyahoga County, preserving not only our structures but our sense of place. In saving older buildings, we preserve much more than bricks and mortar. We preserve our collective memory of the places that add meaning to our lives.

#### A Clinical Trial Gave Me Hope Again:

# One Patient's Perspective

Clevelander Joe Jones was just in second grade when he first developed the painful, scaly lesions of plaque psoriasis. If I can help even one child not have to experience that, I can handle any obstacles from a clinical study," Jones stated.

## **Valley Forge Craft Show Returns**

Saturday March 15th marks the 26th Spring Craft Fair at Valley Forge High School.

Each spring the Cross Country and Swim teams host this annual event; the primary fundraiser for both teams.All proceeds are then funneled to support the athletes in their conditioning and training endeavors.

For Cross Country runners, the biggest investment is shoes. A cheap pair of shoes will wear down quickly and can result in injury, including hip, knee, back, and foot problems. These athletes run well over 350 miles each season; any injury that takes them off the course affects their ability to compete.

Every August, a shoe fitting is coordinated at a local running store. There, athletes are measured and fitted for a proper running shoe. Funds raised at this Craft Fair are used to offset the cost by giving each runner a stipend to apply towards the purchase of new shoes. This allows the athletes to affordably obtain the high quality shoes required for their rigorous training regime.

The Swim Team is typically composed of athletes fairly new to the sport. Of these, many have never swam competitively, making training a more complicated and challenging task, but it is a challenge they willingly take head on!

Every day school is open, these swimmers are in the pool, but swimming is a much more technical sport and utilizing specialized equipment greatly benefits their ability to effectively train. Funds raised will go directly towards the purchase of fins, cords, and paddles which are necessary to help our swimmers improve their technical skills.

Wearing fins while training can improve a swimmers' kick and stroke technique, ankle flexibility, and endurance. Stretch cord training enhances swim-specific strength, conditions specific muscle groups, and mimics swim movements while paddles develop power, speed, efficiency, and build muscle.

Due to constant use and exposure to harsh chemicals, these items must be replaced on a regular schedule. Funds raised will allow proper maintenance and replacement of training equipment.

The student athletes will be manning concessions, helping vendors set up, assisting in take down, and moving equipment, as well as taking food orders and making deliveries to tables. These tasks help the students gain interpersonal communication and social skills that will benefit them now


